INTRODUCTION

Composition 12 is a senior-level English course designed to support students in their refinement and pursuit of mastery of written communication. Students will read and study exemplary compositions by other writers and be exposed to a variety of styles as models for the development of their writing. The course provides opportunities for students, with increasing independence and self-sufficiency, to study, create, and write original and authentic pieces for a range of purposes and audiences using real-world applications with impact and effectiveness.

They will develop their craft through processes of drafting, reflecting, and revising to build a body of publishable work that demonstrates breadth, depth, and evidence of sophistication and specialized writing for a range of situations.

BIG IDEAS

- The exploration of text and story deepens our understanding of diverse, complex ideas about identity, others, and the world.
- People understand text differently depending on their worldviews and perspectives.
- Texts are socially, culturally, geographically, and historically constructed.
- Language shapes ideas and influences others.
- Questioning what we hear, read, and view contributes to our ability to be educated and engaged citizens.

- Recognize an increasing range of text structures and understand how they contribute to meaning

- Express and support an opinion with evidence to achieve purpose
- Evaluate and refine texts to improve clarity, effectiveness, and impact
- Use the conventions of Canadian spelling, grammar, and punctuation proficiently and as appropriate to the context
- Use acknowledgements and citations to recognize intellectual property rights
- Transform ideas and information to create original texts, using various genres, forms, structures, and styles
